Herring elaborated on his own personal view for what an Attorney General should be. "The Attorney General should be the people's lawyer. I always try to fight on the side of people," he said during the call. Herring has worked hard to protect consumers, make environmental protections more legally robust, and reform the criminal justice system. He feels particularly strongly about the state's response to the opioid epidemic. Herring explained, "We're not going to arrest our way out of this problem. The roots of the epidemic are in people's medicine cabinets

and the board rooms of big drug companies." Another major accomplishment of Mr.
Herring was the establishment of the Office for Civil Rights. Herring also answered numerous questions posed by delegates, including controversial political takes. All in all, it was a very inspiring and informative presentation, and Boys State is honored to be addressed by such a high-ranking official.

# Henry City Legislative Delegation Holds First Meeting

Henry City legislators that were sworn into the Boys State General Assembly met for the first time to discuss legislative proposals.

Newly-elected senators and delegates from across Boys State used yesterday as an organizational meeting for party conferences and city legislative delegation conferences. The bipartisan and bicameral legislators from across the eight cities met primarily to put forth three bill proposals per each city, with one bill being eligible for points towards the Boys State Best City award.

Henry legislators opted for unique legislative ideas, including election reform, environmental conservation, and one Boys State organization-related bill on ensuring that information is most accurately conveyed to prospective delegates.

Senator Jason Melendez (Fed.-Henry City) was most enthusiastic about Henry Bill No. 1, a bill that would expand upon a 2020 law that started the process of wider implementation of ranked choice voting. Ranked choice voting is an election method that eliminates strategic voting and non-majority wins by having voters rank candidates in an ordinal manner. This form of voting was used for the 2021 Virginia GOP convention.

Henry Senators Ian Dooley (Nat.-Henry City) and Jason Melendez (Fed.-Henry City) put forth a nomination for Supreme Court justice from the City of Henry who is expected to be considered tomorrow.


