Attitude, Effort and Admiral Dash -Paul Manetto

The featured speaker of the night, Coast Guard Rear Admiral Russell Dash and

Virginia Boys State Alumni, delivered a passionate speech to the attendants of Virginia Boy State, welcoming them to the program and highlighting three pairs of values needed for them to succeed both in the program and in life; attitude and effort, patriotism and citizenship, along with opportunity and responsibility. To begin the speech, Adm. Dash recalled his time at Boys State and his pondering of the question "why am I here?" To answer it, Dash used a quote from Mark Twain "The two most important days in your life are the day you are born and the day you find out why." Dash dissented from Twain's opinion, saying, "if you live your life the right way...you are going to have more than one moment when you realize why you were born". Throughout the first portion of his talk, Dash had repeatedly connected his key points to the themes of attitude and effort, moving into the next section, he switched focus to highlighting the value of patriotism and responsibility of citizenship. He noted benefits always come that with responsibility, and that-with many Boys State Citizens coming of age soon-the responsibilities of citizenship, chiefly the duty to vote, will soon come into play. Dash quotes that "the threat [to democracy] today is probably greater [than when Boys State was founded] that threat is apathy", that being the lack of citizens voting and the lack of a proper education on the key issues. Dash notes that patriotism combined with citizenship is crucial and encourages Boys State Delegates to be grateful and proud of the country they are a part of. The final section of Admiral Dash's talk focused on opportunity and responsibility. Dash

emphasised four key tenets of a responsible citizen; following the law, paying taxes, remaining informed and educated, and serving in your community. These responsibilities empower the opportunity provided by citizenship, from healthcare to justice to education. To close his talk out, Dash left his audience with a piece of advice "Embrace the opportunity with the right attitude and effort!"

- Javier Garcia, Bradley City

- 1. What is the biggest difference between a bad and a good leader?
 - A bad leader has attributes of pride; whereas, a good leader has attributes aimed for the people.
- 2. How do you motivate someone who has a lack of effort?
 - When someone isn't motivated due to an effect of *lack of skill*, it is easy to deal with. On the contrary, people who aren't motivated due to a *lack of will* power are harder to deal with.
 - The main counter to unmotivated individuals would be to simply find what motivates them as a person. (ex. personal goals)
- 3. <u>How do you get people to follow you?</u>
 - You need to be able to *understand* people, and above all, you need to always *value* your workers.
- 4. <u>How do you cooperate with other people that have different viewpoints than you?</u>
 - You first need to ask *why* they think this way. *Avoid buzzwords* within your argument because you need to prove what is genuine to you.
