Speaker Kirk Cox: The Man in the Arena

Over 50 years after his time in the Virginia Boys State program in 1971, former Virginia House Speaker Marvin Kirkland "Kirk" Cox returned to Radford to pass on the knowledge learned during his 30 year span in the Virginia House of Delegates. His first campaign in 1989 ended with a last minute push, including a rush to find donors and the recording of a campaign ad with then senator Jack Warner, Cox secured his seat and was sworn into the House of Delegates, where he served until 2022. Cox was elected speaker after 28 years in the legislature, receiving his party's unanimous vote in 2018. Part of Cox's goal was to explain the duties of the speaker, which range from appointing house officers and committee chairs to selecting a designated survivor for the State of the Commonwealth address. While Cox only served two years as speaker, he cited his biggest accomplishments as being the 120 pieces of Veteran Affairs Legislation passed during his tenure, the Coal Ash Compromise and the tuition rate freeze for the state. Coming into his 2019

reelection bid, Cox found himself in a newly drawn district, one that had voted plus five Clinton in the 2016 presidential race, however, against the odds, the Cox campaign pulled off an upset, winning the district by close to four points. Cox explained to the members of Boys State that he pulled through by showing care for the citizens in his district, doing everything from sending out Christmas cards to hosting movie showings. Speaker Cox provided Boys State citizens with an excitement for the legislative process.

When asked what the one thing he wanted voters to know about his campaign, Granieri emphasized the fact that "[He] is [his] own man", and that he will represent all voters if elected. When asked the same question, Corbett responded by stating that he is "here for you guys", highlighting his experience with servant leadership and his willingness to do what needs to be done.

With 48 hours to go, the gubernatorial race is certainly heating up, but it will undoubtedly get more fiery as the race continues, with more candidates trying to break through every day. What is the most impactful position at Boys State? While some might point to the sheriff, who manages logistics, corrals his citizens, and leads his city across Radford. Others might posit the Governorship; the elected head of state, the face of the program.

Yet, it's the legislative offices who truly hold the most impactful positions. While not as prestigious as Governor and Lieutenant, the legislative branch has the unique ability to craft and pass bills, a power that those positions lack. Indeed, it is legislation that shapes Boys State into what it is. The executives execute. The Legislators legislate, holding the sole power to fundamentally change the day-to-day workings of Boys State. Those who control the legislative branch control where the state rallies its efforts.

"Light pollution hurts the crucial habitats that Virginia needs," he argues, further noting increasing urban development as a worsening factor. Maxwell's proposal expedited for regulations to protect these vital ecosystems exemplifies the program's purpose: To engage in political action rooted from personal convictions. Its citizens like Maxwell, issue driven and policy focused, who shape Boys State at its core. Their work determines not just what the state looks like, but what it truly stands for.

Marshall: Unity Matters
