The People's Protectors

The theme of today's speaker series was the judicial system, with citizens gaining the chance to see how the laws of the nation were made and enforced. The first part of the day featured interviews with Commonwealth Attorneys Justin Griffith, Eric Olsen, Donald Caldwell, Chris Rehak and Bobby Lilly, as well as Judge Michael Doucette. Each brought a unique set of stories and lessons to pass onto Boys State. Entering to a salute by the counselors and town officials of Boys State, Attorney General Jason Miyares offered Boys State a look into the top level of Virginia State Executive Government. Miyares proudly introduced himself as the people's protector, describing his job as a combination of "lawyer and politician". Wanting to share some of his success with the future leaders at Boys State, Miyares explained that his career was built on faith, family, friends and gratitude. He explained that what should be the happiest generation had the highest rate of drug and depression use, explaining the decline as a result of the decrease in religious attendance, and encouraging delegates to find solace in the love of God. The theme of friendship also factored into Miyare's talk with him urging the quote "when you have that connection... keep them close". Miyares reflected on the values taught to him by his family, including an appreciation for the rights American citizens have, highlighted by the stories of his relatives in Cuba. Concluding his speech reflecting on gratitude, Miyares made clear

that while America was not perfect, "what we have is "special" leaving Boys State citizens with food for thought regarding the future of their country.

What is your definition of Justice?

"Justice is treating everyone fairly and equally with a blind eye."




This balanced legislative body will require dialogue and cooperation between Federalists and Nationalists to effectively shape the policies and proposals ahead.

With neither party producing a candidate in the conventions, campaigns are in a full sprint to win their party's nominations. Amidst the uncertainty and density in the candidate field, we interviewed citizens of Boys State to see what they wanted to see in the Governor's Race.

Derrick June of Gravely said that he wanted a Governor that "is for everyone." Some citizens were solidly behind a candidate, whether they were from their party, city, or friends from home, and some citizens were going forward with an open mind, wanting to choose the candidate that aligned with them best.
