Bills

Yesterday, both chambers of the House of Delegates met for the first time. With each city being required to submit two bills to be considered, one to be considered first by the House and one to be considered by the Senate, legislators were eager to get to work, and anxious to see how their respective chambers would receive their bills

The first bill that was passed by the House chamber was a bill from Bradley City to regulate the usage of body cameras in EMS agencies, an issue close to one of the delegates from Bradley, who works as an EMS at home. He said the need for EMS body cameras stems from the need for more training footage, which is especially sparse in the areas of the Commonwealth outside of Northern Virginia. Another bill that was passed the house vote was a Bill from Marshall City to Improve Security Staffing in Virginia Schools, which aims to require Virginia Schools to meet the national recommendations of one School Resource Officer per 1,000 students and one Unarmed Security Staffer per 750 students at all middle and high schools. According to the authors of the bill, who witnessed a stabbing incident at their school in April, aims to improve response times to security incidents in school.

There were also a number of unexpected bills debated on the floor on platforms that have less mainstream recognition. One bill proposed by James City about freedom of self-expression within the state of Virginia, which might provide people with more freedom but it could be labeled as vulgar to the public. Another bill that was present but failed in the house was a proposal to ban chocolate and other flavored milk and reduce dairy products in schools. The idea was to launch a test program and compare the health of the students with or without.

Governor Elections In Virginia

In an effort to keep Boys State citizens informed about the races that will impact them after they leave the campus of Radford University, *The Statesman Daily* is comparing and contrasting the candidates running for Governor of the Commonwealth in 2025. We will get to see these candidates face off against each other in a gubernatorial debate scheduled for November 4th, but before then, we have pieced together a short profile on each candidate.

Lt. Gov. Winsome Earle-Sears(R)

Lt. Governor Earle-Sears, born in Kingstown, Jamaica, immigrated to the United States with her family in search of greater economic opportunity and personal freedoms. She has an MA from Regent University and has served in the United States Marine Corps. Some of Earle-Sears' main issues include reducing the cost of living, primarily by lowering state taxes, supporting law enforcement and cutting down on crime, improving education, and protecting Virginia's right to work without being a union member. Earle-Sears is endorsed by Governor Glenn Youngkin and Attorney General Jason Miyares to preside over the Commonwealth.

Rep. Abigail Spanberger(D)

Del. Abigail Spanberger, originally from New Jersey, came to Virginia during high school and studied at the University of Virginia in Charlottesville. After graduating from UVA, she joined the CIA as an operations officer working to gather intelligence on terrorism and nuclear proliferation, and in 2018, she ran for the US Congress and won, unseating a Republican incumbent. Some of Spanberger's main campaign issues are growing Virginia's economy and making Virginia more affordable, Lowering the cost of healthcare and prescription drugs, investing in Virginia agriculture and rural Virginia, and standing with Virginia's veterans. Spanberger is endorsed by US Senators Tim Kaine and Mark Warner from Virginia, as well as Speaker of the Virginia House of Delegates Don Scott.

The Historical Implications of this Election

No matter which candidate wins this race, Virginia is guaranteed to have its first female Governor in the state's history. If elected, Earle-Sears would be the first Black Female to serve as a governor in the US. The Virginia gubernatorial elections also hold a lot of national significance, as Virginia is a politically diverse state, and it is the first major vote after the previous year's presidential election. With the country watching, who will Virginia elect to lead them for the next four years? As the race draws closer to completion, we encourage Boys State members to stay informed and engaged throughout the duration of the race.
























